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RULES AND CONDITIONS FOR ARBORICULTURAL/FORESTRY AND RELATED MACHINERY OPERATION PROFICIENCY TESTS

A APPLICATION

- 1. The minimum age limit for Candidates taking proficiency tests is 16 years.
 - There is no upper age limit.
- 2. Application forms must be completed (including employer's declaration, where relevant), and sent with the appropriate assessment fee to the Assessment Centre before the test.
- 3. Candidates failing to attend for an assessment without prior notice will normally forfeit the assessment fee.
- 4. Personal Protective Equipment suitable for the test must be used.
- 5. Before coming forward for assessment Candidates should have had sufficient experience to enable them to have a reasonable chance of success and in MOST CASES ALSO HAVE RECEIVED EITHER FORMAL OR INFORMAL INSTRUCTION.

B CERTIFICATION

- 1. Upon the passing of an activity the successful Candidate will receive an acknowledgement.
- 2. Proficiency Test Certificates can be issued on request which may also act as certificates of competence for Health and Safety Purposes.

C ORGANISATION

- 1. Assessments are carried out by industrially based Assessors approved by NPTC. Under no circumstances can either instructors involved in the preparation of Candidates for an assessment or their work place supervisors assess those Candidates in that test.
- 2. Assessment items have been grouped in the assessment schedule for convenience but the order of assessment may be varied.
- 3. In the more extensive activities, and activities where seasonal work is involved, the assessment may be taken in parts but no acknowledgements will be issued until all the necessary parts have been completed.
- 4. Common activities are interchangeable between categories, e.g. Tractor Driving (but see 5 below), Pedestrian Controlled Rotary Cultivator, Manure Spreader, etc.
- 5. The successful completion of the Tractor Driving assessment activity qualifies the Candidate in any category based assessment activity, defined as Tractor Driving, and listed in the current 'List of Category Based Proficiency Tests for Agriculture, Horticulture and Forestry'.
- 6. Before taking an activity involving the use of a tractor the Candidate must normally have passed the Tractor Driving proficiency assessment activity.
- 7. It is strongly recommended that first aid equipment complying with the Health and Safety (First Aid) 1981 regulations be available during the assessments and their organisation.
- 8. Insurance comprehensive insurance arrangements have been made to cover assessment; details of the insurance cover are available on request.

D STANDARDS

- 1. Candidates will be assessed on a competent/not yet competent basis.
- 2. Assessors will ask questions and such questions will be of a practical nature and related to the assessment items concerned.
 - Questions must not be used as a substitute for performing a practical part of the assessment.
- 3. All assessments must be conducted with due regard to legal requirements and safety regulations. Any breach of safety regulations will constitute failure of the assessment. In the event of failure to observe reasonable safety precautions that may lead to damage or injury to persons, stock or equipment, the Assessor may, at his/her discretion, stop the assessment and fail the Candidate.
- 4. Provision of the correct facilities is normally the responsibility of the Assessment Centre; Assessors and Candidates have the right to refuse machinery/equipment which is not suitable or does not comply with safety regulations.
 - Candidates who provide their own equipment, do so on the understanding that if it is not of the required standard, they will forfeit their assessment entry fee.
- 5. Unless otherwise stated, options within any assessment or assessment activity are to be applied at the sole discretion of the Assessor who, in making the decision will take into account local practices.
- 6. Assessors may, at their discretion, stop the assessment and fail Candidates who exhibit such a degree of incompetence, in any part of the assessment, that would indicate their inability to operate the machine or perform the range of skills that the passing of the assessment would imply.
- 7. Where time standards are stated the Assessor may, at his/her discretion, vary these times when the circumstances make it necessary. In other cases the time allowed is at the discretion of the Assessor, according to the conditions and amount of work involved.
- 8. Where applicable an assistant may be allowed to assist the Candidate. No help may be given to the Candidate other than as instructed by the Candidate and approved by the Assessor.
- 9. In all cases where machinery/chemicals are involved the manufacturer's instruction book/directions must be made available to the Candidate.
- 10. Candidates failing up to 25% of an activity may, at the discretion of the Assessor and the Assessment Centre, retake only the parts failed; those failing more than 25% must retake the whole activity.
